With a 10 year background in Youth Justice and Education, Lynette brings a wealth of practice, research, training delivery and 'start-up' co-ordination of an early UK pilot for Teen to Parent Violence and Restorative Practices for Schools. In 2010 she was awarded a Winston Churchill Fellowship Award and spent 8 weeks researching good practice models in America. Her time spent working alongside 'Step Up' facilitators in two Youth Justice Departments, allowed Lynette to observe the week-on-week delivery and effect of this successful group work intervention for teens that are violent at home. Sally Fawcett BA (Hon)

Sally is an experienced and qualified practitioner who has worked in criminal justice for 13 years with young offenders and their parents. With a degree in Youth Justice, she works with high risk, complex cases and has developed a specialist practice around 'teen to parent violence'. In 2010 Sally undertook an independent study entitled, *'An investigation into the causes of Teenage Violence to Parents'*. She delivers professional training, awareness raising and practice development within this subject across a range of family services in her own authority and also works as Associate Trainer for Alternative Restoratives. Sally has been involved in the original development and delivery of a UK multi-agency pilot called *'Do It Different'* since 2009. She continues to lead on co-ordination, development, facilitation and growth of this joint (teen/parent) group work programme that now receives referrals from Youth Offending, Social Services, Domestic Abuse Services, Education, G.P's, Prevention and Early Intervention Services. Sally's extensive group work facilitation experience in this field allows her to bring a front-line perspective to this training event.
